Dear Parents and Carers

A warm welcome back as we begin the summer term, and we hope that you all enjoyed your Easter break. We began this term with the sad news of the passing of Pope Francis, a Pope who touched the lives of so many. This year he inspired us all to become Pilgrims of hope. This morning we joined the parish community in a mass of Remembrance and Celebration of his life and ministry. On Wednesday afternoon, we gathered for a special assembly to remember Pope Francis and to offer him our prayers. In many respects, we are now entering into a key point in history; with the funeral of a Pope and, in the coming weeks, the selection of a new Pope.

Pilgrims of Hope

At the beginning of this year Pope Francis led us in this Jubilee year of Hope. As we broke for the Easter break the children received a prayer care reminding them they are pilgrims of hope. We invite the children to make the prayer of hope a daily prayer.

As we had two-year groups away on Residential at the end of last term, we decided to have our sponsored walk to raise money for Cafod during this half term. Next Wednesday afternoon we will have a special assembly to crown Our Lady with flowers. Children are invited to bring flowers into school on Wednesday to process and adorn the statue of our Lady. This will be a focus throughout the month of May.

The beginning of each term is always a good time to remind everyone of our expectations.

Attendance and Punctuality

We cannot stress enough the importance of regular attendance and punctuality. Disruption impacts on all pupils, and will inevitably prevent them from achieving their potential. Ensuring all parents are aware of Cheshire West and Chester's guidance on fixed penalty notices. We expect all children to be in school by 8.50 am. It is important that the school day begins promptly.

Behaviour Policy

As always, we set high expectations for the behaviour of all children. You will be aware that our behaviour policy focuses on being **Ready, Respectful and Safe.** This half term we will have a particular focus on being Respectful. This will be encouraged through all aspects of school life and when our pupils engage with the wider community. We are particularly proud of the way our pupils meet and greet all members of our school community, they are polite and well-mannered and are considerate of the needs of others. We feel these are really important social skills that can be encouraged from an early age.



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School Uniform

We expect all children to attend school in full school uniform. This includes the following:

Jewellery

Jewellery should not be worn to school Earrings – stud earring only

Prior to the end of last half term, it was noticed that a number of girls were wearing makeup. This will not be permitted. Anybody wearing makeup to school will be asked to remove it immediately.

Hair- in the interest of health and safety, anyone with long hair should have it tied up. We will provide elastic bands if we feel it is necessary.

Readiness for the school day

Please can you ensure that your child has all the necessary equipment for the school day. This includes a water bottle and their reading book and reading diary. Class teachers will advise of any other necessary equipment with you directly.

Progress Reports

Progress reports will be sent out via email on Monday. We encourage you to share them with your child, with a particular focus on the targets set for this term.

If your child receives an invitation to attend an intervention either before or after school, we strongly advise that they do attend. Where children attend the suggested interventions on a regular basis progress is clearly identified.

You will receive an email today with confirmation of your child's club. I would like to extend my grateful appreciation to those parents who have volunteered their time to run a club, also to all staff members. As I am sure you will appreciate there is a wide variety on offer.
