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Learning Project WEEK 4 - Animals		
Year 4		
Weekly Maths Tasks (Aim to do 1 per day)	Weekly Reading Tasks (Aim to do 1 per day)	
 Working on <u>Times Table Rockstars</u> - your child will have an individual login to access this (20 mins on SOUND CHECK). If your child works on <u>Numbots</u>' in school they can access this with the same login. Play on <u>Hit the Button</u> - focus on number bonds, halves, doubles and times tables. Adding totals of the weekly shopping list or some work around money. This game could support work on adding money. Practise telling the time. This could be done through this game (scroll down to access the game). Read to the quarter hour and the nearest 5 minutes. Get a piece of paper and ask your child to show everything they know about Division. This could be pictures, diagrams, explanations, methods etc. They can be as creative as they want to be. (Remember the use of part whole models and partitioning effectively) Please refer to White Rose Maths on the home learning page for tutorials on how to complete the methods we have worked on.) Practise counting forwards and backwards from any given number in 2s. *MyMaths activities are updated every Monday with new activities added. *White Rose Maths is available on the Home Learning Page on the school website and has excellent resources and activities to work through, including some handy video tutorials. 	 You could share a story together. This could be a chapter book where you read and discuss a chapter a day. Listen to your child read and let them discuss what they have read. Encourage them to read with expression and intonation. Watch <u>Newsround</u> and discuss what is happening in the wider world. Get your child to read a book on <u>Oxford Owl</u>, discuss what your child enjoyed about the book. Get your child to read a book on <u>Active learn</u> and complete the activities. These focus on comprehension skills. Explore new vocabulary you find when reading. What are the origins of this word? Can it be modified? Can you find any synonyms or antonyms for your new word? With your child, look in magazines, newspapers and books for new vocabulary they are unfamiliar with. They could use a highlighter to highlight in magazines and newspapers 'I would love to hear about the 'Reading for Pleasure' books you are reading at the moment. Weekly Spelling Tasks (Aim to do 1 per day)	Weekly Writing Tasks (Aim to do 1 per day)
• Practise the Year 3/4 for <u>Common Exception</u> words. This could also be a handwriting task too.	*We have been working on Expanded Noun Phrases, Sentence Openers, Fronted Adverbials (including the comma after it) and effective vocabulary.

The project this week aims to provide opportunities for your child to learn more about key animals they are interested in. Learning may focus on exploring the physical aspects of an animal, their habitat, categorising animals etc.

• Let's Wonder:

Create fact files about deadly predators. Draw pictures of the predators and label them with information they find out. Where does the predator live? Why does it live there? What does it eat? How does it capture its prey? What special qualities do these predators have? Make a <u>food chain</u> to demonstrate why a predator is at the top of the chain. They could make a set of top trump cards using the information they found out.

Try the 'Food Chain Challenge' to test out your knowledge of food chains https://www.bbc.co.uk/bitesize/topics/zbnnb9g/articles/z93vdxs

Extend the activity by looking at where these creatures are often found around the world. Use a world map to locate their habitats. Which continent has the largest amount of deadliest predators? Why do you think this might be? Does the climate have an impact? How will climate change affect these creatures?

Let's Create:

Explore the artist <u>Franz Marc</u>. Find out who he was and what type of artist he was. What did he like to create pictures? Look at some of his paintings online. Then choose an animal to draw and add colour to, in a similar style to his. What do they think of his paintings? Did they like their finished piece of artwork? Why?/Why not?

Be Active:

Get out into the garden and make a <u>bug hotel.</u> Go on a mini beast hunt and record what they find. If they find any minibeasts they haven't seen before they could always look it up online. What can they find out about these amazing creatures? **Recommendation at least 2 hours of exercise a week.**

• Time to Talk:

Find out which animals are their family members' favourites and why. Have a family debate about whether zoos should exist? Discuss whether they agree/disagree and why? Do their family members have a different opinion to them? Why not debate whether animals should be kept as pets?

Understanding Others and Appreciating Differences:

Which animals are considered to be sacred around the world and why? <u>Sacred Animals</u> Who admires cows? Lions? Wolves? Which animals were important to the Egyptians and why?
